

TRITT FAMILY HISTORY VOLUME V RELEASED IN 2023

by Donald Tritt

Tritt Family Research was founded in 1977 with the mission of telling the story of the Tritt family from as early a time as original documents existed. Publication of Volume V brings this story a major step closer to fulfilling this mission. Distinctive features of Volume V are the following.

- An updated, documented account of the earliest Tritt ancestor, Jacob Tritten (1562-1634), born in St. Stephan, Canton Bern, Switzerland.
- Identifies family members of progenitor Jacob Tritten (1562-1634) and his wife Anna Trachsel (1569-1612) and their seven children. Their first four children were sons and the last three were daughters.
- Shown is genealogical data and family history for each of eleven descendant generations of the second son, Hans Tritten (1589-1649) and Madlena Linder (1592-?), a lineage spanning 442 years, from 1562 to 2004. (Descendants of the first son are given in Volume I. Documenting descendants of the third and fourth sons awaits future research.)
- This volume traces a migratory route starting with four generations in St. Stephan, followed by three generations in the vicinity of Stuttgart, Germany, then a generation back in Switzerland, ending with three generations in the United States.
- Gives an etymology showing meaning of the words "tritten" and "tritt" and explains change of surname from Tritten to Tritt and Dritt.
- Tells of early life in the Obersimmental from 2000 B.C. to 1696.

- Gives a history of the establishment of St. Stephan as a community and as a Church with notes from the era of Roman occupation in the Obersimmental.
- Reports on out-migrations of Trittens from St. Stephan in the late 17th century.
- Describes the economic importance of the nearby Rawyl Pass south across the Swiss Alps to Mediterranean lands.
- Gives an account of a Tritt conscripted by Napoleon for his 1812 Russian campaign.
- Summarized are founding events of Switzerland and its close historical relationship with the United States, often regarded as a "Sister Republic."
- Gives documented genealogical data for more than 200 persons.
- Describes organizations, clubs, and societies which welcomed and continue to support Swiss immigrant life in the United States.

- Authored by Donald G. Tritt, Ph.D., the last remaining grandson in this lineage to have direct, personal, and ongoing contact with Swiss immigrant elders.

In color, the front cover depicts the church of St. Stephan. The back cover depicts the Tritt/Tritt Coat of Arms. Volume V is in hardback, contains 212 pages, 142 images in full color (many others in black and white), and is printed on 80-pound acid-free paper. One index gives names of individuals. A second index shows names of places. The front endmap traces the 442-year migratory route of descendants of Hans and Madlena Tritt. The back endmap shows the residential area of the eleventh descendant generation in Columbus, Ohio's "German Village."

TRITT FAMILY HISTORY, VOLUME VI

Volume VI of Tritt Family History will be the story of Christian Tritt (1796-1871), who was born and lived in Cumberland County, Pennsylvania all his life. He was the father of 15 children and has hundreds of descendants living throughout the United States today. Christian was a younger brother of Joseph Tritt, who moved to Ohio and was the subject of Tritt Family History, Volume IV. The Christian Tritt line with 15 branches is a major part of the 1906 Tritt Family Tree. Many of the early Tritt Family researchers were in the Christian Tritt line, including Lydia Bell Duncan, Miss Jennie Tritt, John Howard McCulloch and David Coyle McCulloch. Many current members of Tritt Family Research are descendants of Christian Tritt.

The book begins with a major biography of Christian Tritt, the husband, father, farmer, land owner, and churchman. He played a major role in his community and in the lives of his 15 children. This section will also include copies of his will, inventory, obituary and tributes.

The next section of the book will be biographies of Christian's thirteen children who lived into adulthood. Each of these children had families of their own. Christian had a total of 76 grandchildren, so it is easy to understand why his living descendants would be so numerous.

The book continues with several chapters that focus on various related topics. Some of Christian's children and grandchildren were interested in their family background, did research, kept diaries and notebooks, and produced the 1906 Tritt Family Tree. Many of these

items were helpful in compiling a history of the Christian Tritt line. One chapter focuses on the background of the family, the area where they lived, and what churches they attended.

A major part of the book will be the family data section where the Christian Tritt family up to the present will be presented. In this section I intentionally tried to bring all the family lines (male and female) up to the present. Many women are interested in the genealogy of both sides of their family, not just the side that carries the family surname.

One chapter is devoted to a driving tour of "Christian Tritt Country." This chapter will be illustrated with historic and current photos of sites and places that Christian Tritt would have known in his lifetime. It will include driving directions if someone wanted to visit the area.

The final section of the book will be composed of biographies of some Christian Tritt descendants of note that were written and contributed by various authors. The final chapter of the book will be an autobiography "My Story" that was written by William Wayne Tritt before his death in 2011. This volume of Tritt Family History is dedicated to Wayne, who was a very active member and treasurer of Tritt Family Research from its founding in 1977 until 2007.

What remains to do is to select photos and illustrations for the articles, and work with a designer to lay out the book for the printer. The goal is to have the book in hand by the TFR annual meeting August 2024.

In the evening, we met at the home of Dave and Robyn Wampler in Carlisle for a delicious meal prepared by Robyn.

Saturday's business meeting was also held at the annex of the Cumberland County Historical Society.

Donald Tritt distributed his report on the recently published Volume V which deals with Donald Tritt's line, Hans Tritten (b.ca. 1589). Donald stated that Hans Helmann, a freelance writer in the Simmental, contacted him about our writing a family history of our origins in Switzerland which resulted in printing an article on Volume V of Tritt Family History in the Berner Oberlander newspaper on July 6, 2023. Donald then expressed his appreciation to Leonard Tritt for his editorial review and meticulous proofreading of Volume V.

We then discussed pricing of the various volumes of Tritt Family History the conclusions of which are reflected on the sale items at the end of this newsletter.

Richard Tritt discussed the progress of Volume VI which covers Christian Tritt (b. 1796) and his descendants. He will soon be working with the person doing the layout of the book to get this volume ready for print in the near term.

Jaime Dritt was able to glean new information on the Dritt line while going through the archive files on Friday and feels more confident in moving forward with writing a history on this line. She plans to visit the York Heritage Center in York, Pennsylvania so she can move forward on her research.

TFR PUBLICATIONS

During the TFR business meeting of 2023, the members discussed the volumes of Tritt books that have been written and published. Five have been printed and one more will be printed in 2024. It is possible, with more research, that there will be a Dritt Family book published at a later date.

In reviewing the sale of books, an overview of the contents published are:

- Volume I – Ancestry, life and times of brothers Hans Peter and Christian Tritt – immigrants from Switzerland to Pennsylvania in 1739, and their children.
- Volume II – Johann Paul Tritt, born in 1752 in York County, PA
- Volume III – Christian Tritt, 1739 immigrant, and his son Henry Tritt, born in 1742
- Volume IV – Joseph Tritt, born in 1786 in Cumberland County, PA and settled in Stark and Summit Counties, Ohio

- Volume V – Tritten/Tritt Progenitor Jacob Tritten 1562-1634
- Volume VI – Christian Tritt, born in 1796, Cumberland County, PA (to be printed in 2024)

In reviewing the books, it is suggested that Volume I would be valuable to anyone in any of the Hans Peter and Christian Tritt lines to learn about the European origins of the family and their first generation in America. We feel it is very important to have Volume I if you want to connect to your line back in Switzerland. That volume leads you to your direct line. TFR members at the 2023 meeting decided to sell Volume I for \$20.

Volumes II through VI are priced at \$40 each. Postage per book within the United States is \$7, to be sent via media mail.



JEANETTE C. (CRAMER) MILLER

Nov 27, 1953 – July 11, 2023

Jeanette came to the TFR meetings with a big smile on her face and a willing heart to do whatever job was asked of her. At her death, she was writing a chapter for Volume VI of Tritt Family History. Jeanette also went on the remigration trips to Switzerland sponsored by TFR accompanied by her husband, Richard, and her mother, Gladys Cramer, who was of Tritt lineage. Jeanette's passing left a hole in the TFR meeting this past August. Jeanette is survived by her brother, David Cramer, and his wife, Patricia, as well as her beloved cats.



DRITT FAMILY TREASURES: A VISIT TO THE YORK COUNTY HISTORY CENTER

In the fall of 2021, three historical artifacts connected to the Dritt family line were left to the York County History Center (YCHC) in York, Pennsylvania. These items include a tall case clock, a slant-top desk, and a framed sampler. These items are currently in storage at the YCHC. In September 2023, I made an appointment with Emily Immel, the YCHC collections manager, so I could photograph these artifacts and learn more about their history. In addition to giving me a tour of these and other Dritt artifacts, Emily also provided me with some background information about each item and how they came to be at the YCHC.

TALL CASE CLOCK

General Jacob Dritt (1746–1817) was the original owner of this tall case clock, which was once part of the Dritt Mansion furnishings on Long Level Road near Wrightsville, Pennsylvania. According to an appraisal, this clock was manufactured in York County between 1790–1800. It is a Chippendale clock made of cherry wood, and the carved scrolls at the top of the clock were a typical design in York County during the late eighteenth century. While this clock has some typical characteristics of the time period, the appraisal describes the dial as having an unusual design for a clock made in Pennsylvania. It includes a moon-phase mechanism, a date-and-year hand on the center dial, and a day-of-the-week dial underneath the center dial. The appraisal states that this clock likely came out of the shop of John Fisher (1736–1808), a prominent clockmaker and artist in York County during the late eighteenth century. However, the YCHC datasheet also cites evidence from



the *Journal of the Lancaster Historical Society* that attributes the clock to John Hoff (1776–1818), a clockmaker in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. It appears that the manufacturer of the clock cannot be identified with absolute certainty.

This clock passed through several generations of Dritt descendants through a maternal line before winding up at the YCHC. John Dritt (1787–1872) inherited the clock from his father General Jacob Dritt, and then left it to his own daughter Julianna Dritt (1816–1892). Julianna Dritt married Alexander Frank (1813–1888), which is how the clock came into the Frank family. The clock was passed down through the Frank family until George Frank bequeathed the clock to his second-cousin, Margaret Wilson Masters, around 1956. This clock, as well as the slant-top desk and framed sampler, ultimately found their home at YCHC as part of a bequest of Margaret's son, Frank Masters, Jr.

SLANT-TOP DESK

Ownership of this desk is also attributed to General Jacob Dritt, and was probably a part of the furnishings of the Dritt Mansion near Wrightsville. The desk was built approximately between 1800–1830. It is about 46 inches high and 19.25 inches wide. The top is slanted and hinged, and it opens to form a flat surface for writing. When the


top is opened, six small drawers and twelve rectangular compartments are revealed. The desk also has three large lower drawers that are opened with gold metal drawer pulls. Though this desk was a part of the bequest of Frank Masters, Jr., there is much less information about its background.

Being curious, or just nosy, I explored what was inside the lower drawers. One of these drawers had interesting items from a more recent period, probably ranging from the 1960s and 1970s. It contained a variety of LP records that mostly focused on natural science, including A Field Guide to Bird Songs and The Language and Music of Wolves narrated by Robert Redford. There were also several mysterious cassette tapes. This desk appears to be a time capsule within a time capsule, which I would love to explore more fully in the future.

FRAMED SAMPLER

The framed sampler is the most personal and possibly most precious artifact in the bequest from Frank Masters, Jr. It was made by Julianna Dritt, the granddaughter of General Jacob Dritt and the half-sister of my ancestor John Burke Dritt (1814–1884). It contains upper-

case and lower-case alphabets in white, green, blue, and orange thread. It is embroidered with two blue birds and flowers at the bottom and a green vine along the border with blue, white, pink, and orange flowers. The following text is cross-stitched along the bottom: “Julianna B. Dritt’s Work York May 3 [or 2], 1828”.



Two Bible verses from Proverbs were also stitched on the sampler, though they are difficult to read. A document providing information about the sampler was pasted on the back of the frame. It was signed by Margaret Wilson Masters, dated May 30, 1958, and contains the following text:

“This sampler is the work of Julianna B. Dritt, born February 22, 1816; died March 13, 1892; married June 19th, 1839 to Alexander Frank, of York, Penna. He was born February 14th, 1813, and died April 1, 1888.

“The sampler was made in 1827, in her eleventh year. She was the daughter of John B. Dritt, born March 17, 1787; died March 28, 1872, and his wife Polly Laub. They were married April 20th, 1815.; the grand-daughter of General Jacob Dritt, born 1746, an officer in the Revolutionary War, who was drowned in the Susquehanna River near Long Level, where he lived, December 19th, 1817.

“The Biblical verses which are now almost indistinguishable [sic](1958) are:

*“She stretcheth [sic] out her hand to the poor, yeah [sic], she reacheth forth her hand to the needy.” Proverbs; 31st Chapt., 28th verse.**

*“Her children rise up and call her blessed her husband also, and he praiseth her.” Proverbs: 31st Chapt. 20th verse.**

“This came from the estate of Julianna’s last living grandson, Alexander Hardy Frank, who died April 12, 1958, to his second-cousin, Margaret Wilson Masters, and was partially restored by her.

“The sampler has thus accompanied the grandfather’s clock down the years and through the procession of generations.”



MILITARY POWDER HORN

While my main agenda was to see these three artifacts, Emily also showed me a military powder horn that was owned by General Jacob Dritt and dated to 1775. This item took me by surprise; I was aware of another powder horn that was owned by General Jacob Dritt and that was inscribed with the date 1777 and with references to specific battles. This is clearly a different powder horn and lacks any inscriptions. It is made of smooth curved bone, has a wooden stopper at the narrow end, and has red hardened leather or a painted wood cap at the larger end. It was left to the YCHC in 1990 by Elizabeth P. Frank and appears to be another Dritt artifact that probably passed through Julianna Dritt to the Frank family line.

Overall, my trip to the YCHC was a successful mission. I appreciate the time and resources that Emily Immel provided me. I am trying to coordinate a visit to the YCHC during the Tritt Family Meeting on Friday, August 16, 2024. Apparently, the YCHC is still in the process of moving with a target date in January 2024, so they could not guarantee their availability yet. I will continue to follow up with the YCHC. If you come to the meeting next year, you might be able to see these magnificent artifacts for yourself!
